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
THOUSANDS TO LOSE OUT IF FREE TV LICENCES ABOLISHED

Funding of free TV licences for those over 75 is to be dumped on the BBC by the Government from June 2020.

A consultation has been undertaken setting out possible options to off-set these costs. We have obtained information on the number of older people in York who will be affected by the proposals.

- Currently 13700 households in York have someone over 75 eligible for a free licence.
- If the qualifying age was raised to 80 years old, 4840 would lose out.
- If the entitlement to a free licence was limited to those receiving pension credits, then 10960 would lose out

The loss of the annual license fee of £154 would wipe out the increase in State Pension for 2019 of £3.25 per week.



The BBC is one of our greatest national assets and shouldn't have to endure a massive cut in funding to provide a social welfare measure which is not its responsibility.

80,000 people have signed the Age (UK) petition demanding the Government scrap the proposals.

THE ASSEMBLY – WHAT DO WE DO?

DENTISTRY IN YORK

Martin Ramsdale – Registrar in Dental Public Health addressed the Open Meeting in February. Taken together with key information from a comprehensive report from Healthwatch in 2018 provides a picture of Dental Services in York.

Overall there are 30 Dental Practices in York. 18 of these are wholly private and of the remainder only 8 offer services to NHS patients and private payers. Others specialise in orthodontics – dealing with correction of mal positioned teeth and jaws etc.

The charges for services are set out below:

Description of Service	NHS Cost	Private Cost
Band 1 – Examination, scale and polish etc.	£21.60	£70
Band 2 – Fillings, extractions etc.	£59.10	£82 - £165
Band 3 – As above plus crowns/dentures/bridges	£265.50	From £500

Eleven services offered late evening appointments (after 6pm) and eight offered Saturday mornings by appointment.

The key findings from the Healthwatch survey

- 46% couldn't find an NHS dentist
- 45% had been trying for between 1 and 2 years
- 82% rated their experience of their dentist as good/ excellent

The majority who found an NHS dentist did so by ringing round practices. Others used the service of NHS choices www.nhs.uk.

Availability of dentists accepting NHS patients is clearly a major issue in York and taken together with difficulties in accessing such services requires further action.



FOCUS ON MENTAL HEALTH





The new Mental Health hospital on Haxby Road is fast becoming a reality as the picture shows. Following consultation with the public the number of planned beds was increased from 60 to 72. It is due for completion early in 2020 and is designed with state of the art facilities which will support users, families and carers.

On the downside the Government has revealed that the existing Bootham Park Hospital is to be sold to the highest bidder. Following representation by Rachael Maskell MP, assurances were originally given by Jeremy Hunt, the then Health Secretary, that the sale process would be "paused" until March 3rd, 2019 whilst alternative proposals were developed locally for the site. However, the new Minister of State for Health, Stephen Hammond MP has overturned the previous undertaking and the appointment of a preferred bidder is imminent.

Meanwhile, following extensive consultation with local residents and after receiving 2000 comments from the public, detailed proposals were developed to include:

- Retention of some locally based mental health services
- High-end care apartments in the main building
- A 60 bed care home providing private and "hospital discharge" beds
- Land for 194 homes including keyworker accommodation
- Retaining all land in front of the site for sports, school and community use

What Now?

Pressure must be put on the planners at the Council to persuade the eventual bidder to adopt in whole or in part the proposals developed locally for the benefit of the people of York.
