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INTERNATIONAL DAY OF OLDER PEOPLE -1ST OCTOBER 2021

In 1990, the United Nations General Assembly designated October 1st to celebrate the contributions that older people make to society.

Each year a different theme was adopted. So, for 2020 it was "Pandemics - Do They Change How We Address Age and Ageing?" It was to raise awareness of the impact on an ageing population and the need to ensure people can grow old with dignity.

The theme for the current year 2021 is "Digital Equity for All Ages." Research indicates that



women and older people experience digital inequity to a greater extent than other groups in society. They either lack access to technologies or are often not benefiting fully from the opportunities provided by technological progress.

York Explore is leading on this topic across the City, but the Assembly has arranged as part of the 50+ Festival a range of opportunities to become more digital savvy.

COVID CARE HOME DEATHS IN YORK REVEALED

The Care Quality Commission have finally published information on care home deaths from Covid-19 for each Council area. This covers the period from April 2020 to March 2021. In England as a whole, 39.000 deaths were recorded. In York 150 care home residents died from Covid-19. In summary, the homes most effected were:

It needs to be remembered that during this period not all older people being discharged from hospital were tested before returning to their care home, additionally not all staff at the care homes were required to have two vaccinations!

HEALTHY ACTIVE AGEING

York St. John University has launched a new programme including a range of activities specifically for older people.



Initially, an allotment project "Growing Active" started on the 25th August and will run weekly on Wednesdays between 10am to 11am. It is based at the Haxby Road Allotments across the road from the Haxby Road Sports Park where parking is available.

"THE RETREAT" – LOOKING BACK – LOOKING FORWARD

"The Retreat" was founded in 1792 by William Tuke and fellow Quakers to offer a more humane way of treating people with mental illness. Until then the only secure building was the York lunatic Asylum (Bootham Park).

Plans have now been revealed to develop a dedicated "Brain Injury" hospital in the grounds of the former Terry's Chocolate Factory. This proposal by "the Disabilities Trust" and a developer will provide 4 wards, offering 36 flats and 4 assessment flats for those seeking more independence.



The main building at the "Retreat" will be converted into residential accommodation. Some physiological therapy services will however continue to be available at Heslington Road.

FREE PRESCRIPTIONS AT RISK FOR 60 - 65 YEAR OLDS



The Government has announced that they are planning to move the qualifying age for free prescriptions from 60 to the current pension age of 66. Many older people will be badly affected, with some saying they will have to choose between paying for medication or other bills.

At £9.35 per item and with 4 items per prescription, this amounts £37.40 per prescription. Members views are sought on the plans and whether the Assembly should join with Age (UK) in protesting to the Government.

Members will recall that the entitlement to a free bus pass was originally set at the age of 60, but has in recent years been raised to the State Retirement age of 66.

CARD PAYMENTS - NOT FOR EVERYONE!!!

During the pandemic, a number of shops advertised that they would only accept payment for goods with a credit or debit card. Even with restrictions having been relaxed, many of these shops have continued with the practice.

Some older people do not have either a credit or debit card. What happens to them when they wish to use the currency of the realm to make their purchase? They are denied this freedom of choice.

The Assembly is making representations to Age (UK) to campaign against this obvious discrimination of older people.



CARE PROVIDER RATED "OUTSTANDING"

The Great Care Company at Kettlestring Lane, is a home care agency providing care and support to people in their own homes, who are older or have physical difficulties or suffer from dementia.



They have received an "Outstanding" rating by the Care Quality Commission, an independent body established to monitor performance in the care sector. The recent report states:

"People's well-being and happiness were made a priority by the care company who exceeded contractual obligations to ensure people's independence, welfare, social and emotional needs were promoted and provided for".

The Company, based in Louth and with a local office in York, were rated in the top 20 of Care Providers nationally. Congratulations to all those involved. They can be contacted by ringing 0333 200 7199.

LAST WORD - LEWIS CREED

Fondly remembered by many, Lewis Creed, who was manager of St. Sampson's Centre for 12 years until 1992, died on the 6th August age 91. St Sampson's Church was declared redundant in 1968 and was re-opened by the Queen Mother 6 years later as a social centre for those over 60.

Lewis was a former art teacher for 22 years in Buckinghamshire, developed the centre as a hub for older people offering hot and cold food in a relaxed environment and encouraging companionship to all in the absence of children!!

Lewis was concerned that too many older people were living alone or at home watching TV and getting bored. He wanted there to be an opportunity for older people to socialise in a relaxing and welcoming environment. His greatest regret was that other major towns had not imitated what had been achieved in York. He will be greatly missed.
