As we close this year's 50+ festival, the memories stay rooted

On Wednesday 1 October, the International Day of Older People, this year's Festival came to a close after an action-packed ten days celebrating and connecting older citizens across York.

Featuring over 100 activities, ranging from history talks, language taster sessions and walking netball to over-50s ballet, home and driving safety and *Deal or No Deal*, the Festival offered something for everyone, whether you fancied cake and connection, fish and chips, origami or a *Strictly*—inspired dance.

The finale followed Saturday's special celebration, where crowds of residents and visitors gathered to enjoy the joyful 50+ Grand Parade and a host of musical delights in the heart of our city.

Addressing the Grand Parade, **The Sheriff of York, Paul Doughty** expressed: "Today, we come together to celebrate the contribution older people make to our city through family life, community, work, volunteering, creativity and care. It is quite simply a show of energy, talent and resilience and we're a stronger city when all ages are valued and included. I want to thank YOPA and Age UK York for your vision and leadership and the tireless efforts of volunteers. The role of older people has never been more important - older people enrich York."

Professor Dianne Willcocks, vice chair of York Older People's Assembly added: "The 50+ Festival is a real celebration of the resilience, sense of fun and love of life that older people demonstrate and their real desire to contribute to community and wellbeing. Old friends were reunited, sharing happy surprises in their different hats, while new friendships were formed, especially with some of the younger members of our parade. Visitors may have discovered a fresh perspective of our city: not only one of history and







heritage, but also a community of elders looking forward, embracing connection and celebrating life in later years."

Rachael Maskell, MP for York Central, speaking at the closing event, said: "The 50+ Festival is an incredible opportunity for people to build social connections. As Chair of the APPG for Ageing and Older People, I've seen how, as people get older, they can sometimes become more isolated. Events like this provide a chance to meet others and try new activities, like I did with walking rugby. It's all about enrichment, friendship and caring."

Simon Holmes, CE Age UK York reflected: "An older population in York is something to celebrate. There are challenges but there's also lots of fun. Given the success of the festival, we held a bonus event at the very start - a Slipper Social which generated a queue before we even opened. It's all built on collaboration and we owe so much to our partners. The togetherness, the singing and the dancing created such a wonderful atmosphere - a true reflection of the best things about our city."

Jenny Collieson Vice-Chair of Age UK York highlighted: "The Festival Steering Group would like to extend a huge thank-you to everybody who contributed to our 20th anniversary celebration - the local businesses and organisations sponsoring our activities and showcasing what they can offer and all the many individuals and community groups providing events and support in so many ways to help make this year's programme such a full and diverse one."
