Happy Christmas and a Peaceful New Year

PENSIONS UP IN APRIL 2026 BY 4.8%

In 2010 the Government introduced the "triple lock" on pensions which guaranteed increasing pensions by the highest of price increases, average earning or 2.5%.

This year the basic and new State Pensions will be increased by 4.8%, in line with the increase in average weekly earnings in the year to May-July 2025.

From April 2026, the full annual rate of the new State Pension will increase by around £575. The full annual rate of the basic State Pension will increase by around £440.

The Standard Minimum Guarantee in Pension Credit will increase by 4.8% in line with the increase in average earnings. From April, it will be £238.00 a week for a single pensioner and £363.25 a week for a couple, ensuring the incomes of poorest pensioners are protected. The actual amount you receive relates directly to the number of years of National Insurance contributions you have paid.

OPEN MEETINGS continue to thrive

Our Open meetings continue to offer informed background and information to attendees. In November we had Peter Roderick, Director of Public Health for City of York with the topic Health in an Ageing Society.

Did you know that

- The population of York is due to grow from 206,000 to 241,000 by 2040.
- The over 85 year olds will grow by 50%
- There will be 52,000 aged over 65
- 25% of over 65yo do not access digital services
- There are 800 falls pa leading to hospital admissions (mostly older people)

These and many other facts were commented on and a wide-ranging debate took place.

Sara shared a progress update on Social Care in the City of York, which included partnerships, engagement, and improvement in basic processes.

Closer ways of working with the NHS have been developed and working with other local authorities and the Universities helps to find out what works early on. They are looking to engage with the public more to

improve services, collaborating with People First, Mind and The Carers Action Group.In addition, they will implement simpler processes e.g. replacing a 27-page form with a simpler online version to help create an efficient and effective organisation.

Sara also introduced Anne Howgate, the new Assistant Director for Access, Prevention and Improvement. Anne will look at hospital discharges, community Occupational Therapists and community social work.

Sara responded to many questions from the audience and was thanked for her continued hard work.

A Community Effort: Stamp Out Loneliness
